# „Migration and Corona“

Initiative of the UNIC member universities

The Corona Virus Covid-19 is changing and challenging the social, economic, cultural and political world we are living in. Our everyday lifeworld was shocked by friends and relatives affected or threatened by disease, by lock-downs and minimizing direct social encounters, by unemployment, short time working and breakdown of companies. Individual and democratic rights are suspended, training and education turned to virtual methods.

**In this context, not only practical but also questions relevant in social sciences arise:**

- How will especially vulnerable groups like migrants and refugees be affected?
- Why do nation states allow tens of thousands of seasonal workers but reject refugees?

These questions and others (like the specific local situation of migration, Corona and transmittances) will be addressed in a multi-disciplinary social science perspective. Given the specific experiences and challenges of the Corona-crisis in Europe the Lecture Series is organized in a joint effort by the eight universities affiliated in UNIC.\* At the same time, the course is accredited at RUB as Master course for modules “Interkul-turalität” IK/Straub, „Internationalisierung und Transnationalisierung“ IT/Van Loon, „Spezielle und aktuelle Bereiche des Gesundheitswesens“ SAG/Werding, and „Arbeit und Organisation“ A&O/Pries. Prof. Dr. Ludger Pries is responsible organizer and addressee of the course.

The Master Course is organized on a weekly basis. It includes a Video Lecture by one of the social science scholars of a UNIC university. There will be additional reading material and tasks for participating Master students. For credit points at RUB, an attendance record (Teilnahmenachweis TN) requires active and continuous participation as well as delivering the ongoing tasks for each session; for a proof of performance (Leistungsnachweis LN) a final term paper based on an individual or collective work has to be elaborated.

**Additionally, inter-university student working groups are welcome researching specific aspects like:**

Results of such group work could be presented online/in video meetings or by papers.



How is Corona impacting informal and formal migrant work in my city (e.g. care work, seasonal work)?

How are images of migration and migrants changing due to Corona in public discourse in my country and city?

How is the spread of Corona related to international mobility of which kind of persons (e.g. high qualified expatriates and managers, politicians and artists versus informal precarious migrants)?

How is Corona affecting directly and indirectly the situation and destiny of refugees and other forced migrants?
